- Audience
 - The Bildungsroman doesn't just tell a story. It involves the reader in the same process of education and development as the main character. The aim is to affect the reader's personal growth as well. However, at some point in the narrative, the reader may be in disagreement with the protagonist. Realizing that the hero has made a mistake in judgment, the reader, in effect, learns from the situation before the protagonist or otherwise compares his/her own morality against the moral of the story that the hero eventually learns.
- Character
 - In the Bildungsroman, the focus is on one main character. The structure of the Bildungsroman is to follow this one character from youth to adulthood. Other characters exist in the story, but only in roles that have some kind of connection with the protagonist.

A History of the Bildungsroman Sarah Graham, 2019-01-03 The Bildungsroman has been one of the most significant genres in Western literature since the eighteenth century. Margaret Atwood and the Female Bildungsroman Ellen McWilliams, 2017-03-02 Examining Margaret Atwood's work in the context of the complex history of the Bildungsroman, Ellen McWilliams explores how the genre has been appropriated by women writers in the second half of the twentieth century. She demonstrates that Atwood's early work, her own coming-of-age fiction including unpublished works as well as *The Edible Woman*, *Surfacing*, and *Lady Oracle*, both engages with and works against the paradigms of identity which are traditionally associated with the genre. Making extensive use of unpublished manuscripts in the Atwood Collection at the University of Toronto, McWilliams uncovers influences that shaped Atwood's fashioning of identity in her early novels, paying particular attention to Atwood's preoccupation with survival as a key symbol of Canadian literature, culture, and identity. She also considers the genre's afterlife on display in *Cat's Eye*, *The Robber Bride*, *Alias Grace*, *The Blind Assassin*, and *Moral Disorder*, in which the formulations of selfhood and identity in Atwood's early fiction are revisited and developed. Atwood emerges as a writer who self-consciously invokes and then undercuts the traditions of the Bildungsroman, a turn that may be read as a means of at once interrogating and perpetuating the form. McWilliams's book furthers our understanding of subjectivity in Atwood's fiction and contributes to ongoing conversations about the role gender and cultural contexts play in reframing generic boundaries. A History of the Bildungsroman Petru Golban, 2018-09-30 This book establishes a vector of methodology in the approach to a particular type of fictional discourse, namely the English Bildungsroman, the novel of identity formation. Its wide-ranging critical perspectives are also useful to anyone concerned with, first of all, European and English novelistic genres, but also to those interested in theoretical perspectives of modern fiction studies in general, as well as in certain aspects of Western literature as a developing tradition. Growing Up Ethnic Martin Japtok, 2005-04 *Growing Up Ethnic* examines the presence of literary similarities between African American and Jewish American coming-of-age stories in the first half of the twentieth century. Often these similarities exceed what could be explained by sociohistorical correspondences alone. Martin Japtok argues that these similarities result from the way both African American and Jewish American authors have conceptualized their ethnic situation. The issue of race and its social

repercussions certainly defy any easy comparisons. However, the fact that the ethnic situations are far from identical in the case of these two groups only highlights the striking thematic correspondences in how a number of African American and Jewish American coming of age stories construct ethnicity. JapTok studies three pairs of novels: James Weldon Johnson's *Autobiography of an Ex-Coloured Man* and Samuel Ornitz's *Haunch Paunch and Jowl*; Jessie Fauset's *Plum Bun* and Edna Ferber's *Fanny Herself*; and Paule Marshall's *Brown Girl, Brownstones* and Anzia Yezierska's *Bread Giver*, and argues that the similarities can be explained with reference to mainly two factors: ultimately intertwined cultural nationalism and the Bildungsroman genre. *Growing Up Ethnic* shows that the parallel configurations in the novels, which often see ethnicity in terms of spirituality as inherent artistic ability and as communal responsibility, are rooted in nationalist ideology. However, due to the authors' generic choice, the Bildungsroman's tendency to view ethnicity through the rhetorical lens of communalism and spiritual essence runs head-on into the individualist assumptions of the protagonist-centered Bildungsroman. The negotiations between these ideological counterpoints characterize the novels and reflect and refract the intellectual ferment of their time. This fresh look at ethnic American literatures in the context of cultural nationalism and the Bildungsroman will be of great interest to students and scholars of literary and race studies.

Body Politics in Contemporary Irish Women's Fiction Ellen Scheible, 2024-12-12 Exploring twentieth and twenty-first century texts that wrestle with the Irish domestic interior as a sexualized and commodified space, this book provides readings of the power and authority of the feminized body in Ireland.
