ASSESSED.

- Words ending in a communicat other than a or a have stress on the last syllable and are called pathsbras agadus: doc-gg (doctor), en-pa-dad (Spanish), fe-B-cl-dad (Imprinces)
- When a word does not conform to either of the previously mentioned rules, a written accord indicates where the stress falls: ca-\$\frac{1}{2}\$ (coeffect, \$\frac{1}{2}\$-bot (treet, e-\frac{1}{2}\$-me-nes (counts); words with stress on the third from the last syllable are called pulsaboras autropalas.

SYLLABIFICATION

- A single vowel sound, with or without accompanying consensants, makes up a syllable
 - Diplotongs and triplotongs blend to make a single vowel sound and cannot be divided.
 - A digitationing contribution is strong covered (a, e, e) and a weak covered (b, e): gi-re (ser), ex-ter-dige-te (student); two weak covereds can also form a diphotomy, eig-died (city), rgi-de (moise)
- A triplellong consists of a strong versel between two weak once conti-nggly (yes continue)

- Not used in certain situations, such as after ser (to be) when the noun following ser is not modified: Ye say professors. (I am a toucher.) For Ye say and busine professors. (I am a good toucher.)
