writings of Wendell Phillips and defending the abolitionist John Brown Thoreau's philosophy of civil disobedience later influenced the political thoughts and actions of such notable figures as Leo Tolstoy Mahatma Gandhi and Martin Luther King Jr Thoreau is sometimes referred to as an anarchist Though Civil Disobedience seems to call for improving rather than abolishing government I ask for not at once no government but at once a better government the direction of this improvement points toward anarchism That government is best which governs not at all and when men are prepared for it that will be the kind of government which they will have
