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Sol Plaatje's Mhudi Sabata-mpho Mokae, Brian Willan, 2021 Sol Plaatje's Mhudi is the first full length novel in English to have been written by a black South African and is widely regarded as one of South Africa's most important literary works Set in the 1830s it tells the tale of Mhudi and Ra Thaga a romantic story set against a violent backdrop of war between Barolong and Matebele complicated by the intrusions of Boer trekkers with whom the Barolong form an alliance It is notable among other things for the way Plaatje uses the past to explore the roots of the oppression and injustice suffered by his people a century later when the book was written Page 4 of cover Sol Plaatje's Native Life in South Africa Janet Remmington, Brian Willan, Bhekizizwe Peterson, 2016-10-01 Sheds new light on Native Life appearing at a critical historical juncture and reflects on how to read it in South Africa's heightened challenges today First published in 1916 Sol Plaatje's Native Life in South Africa was written by one of the South Africa's most talented early twentieth century black leaders and journalists Plaatje's pioneering book arose out of an early African National Congress campaign to protest against the discriminatory 1913 Natives Land Act Native Life vividly narrates Plaatje's investigative journeying into South Africa's rural heartlands to report on the effects of the Act and his involvement in the deputation to the British imperial government At the same time it tells the bigger story of the assault on black rights and opportunities in the newly consolidated Union of South Africa and the resistance to it Originally published in war time London but about South Africa and its place in the world Native Life travelled far and wide being distributed in the United States under the auspices of prominent African American W E B Du Bois South African editions were to follow only in the late apartheid period and beyond The aim of this multi authored volume is to shed new light on how and why Native Life came into being at a critical historical juncture and to reflect on how it can be read in relation to South Africa's heightened challenges today Crucial areas that come under the spotlight in this collection include land race history mobility belonging war the press law literature language gender politics and the state

Migration, Human Rights and Literature Fareda Banda, 2020-12-24 This innovative book looks at the topic of migration through the prism of law and literature The author uses a rich mix of novels short stories literary realism human rights and comparative literature to explore the experiences of African migrants and asylum seekers The book is divided into two Part one is conceptual and focuses on art activism and the myriad ways in which people have sought to write justice Using Mazrui s diasporas of slavery and colonialism it then considers histories of migration across the centuries before honing in on the recent anti migration policies of western states Achiume is used to show how these histories of imposition and exploitation create a bond which bestows on Africans a status as co sovereigns of the First World through citizenship The many fictional examples of the schemes used to gain entry are set against the formal legal processes Attention is paid to life post arrival which for asylum seekers may include periods in detention The impact of the increased hostility of receiving states is examined in light of their human rights obligations Consideration is paid to how Africans navigate their post migration lives which includes reconciling themselves to status fracture taking on jobs for which they are over qualified while simultaneously dealing with the resentment borne of status threat on the part of the citizenry Part two moves from the general to consider

the intersections of gender and status focusing on women LGBTI individuals and children Focusing on their human rights and the fictional literature chapter four looks at women who have been trafficked as well as domestic workers and hotel maids while chapter five is on LGBTI people whose legal and literary stories are only now being told The final substantive chapter considers the experiences of children who may arrive as unaccompanied minors Using a mixture of poetry and first person accounts the chapter examines the post arrival lives of children some of whom may be citizens but who are continually made to feel like outsiders The conclusion follows starting with two stories about walls by Hadero and Lanchester which are used to illustrate the themes discussed in the book Few African lawyers write about literature and few books and articles in Western law and literature look at books by or about Africans so a book that engages with both is long overdue This book provides fascinating reading for academics students of law literature gender and migration studies and indeed the general public Youth and Non-Violence in Africa's Fragile Contexts Akin Iwilade, Tarila Marclint Ebiede, 2022-10-22 This book makes an important contribution to the conflict literature and to new ways of thinking about agency and social life in fragile contexts It does this by engaging with often ignored peace infrastructures In this book the contributors highlight different ways in which non violence is deployed by Africa s youth to navigate difficult violent contexts Drawing on empirically grounded case studies from the Central African Republic to Zimbabwe this book explores how similar or indeed the same social infrastructures can be deployed for both violence and non violence and the important factors that drive many youth to take the non 1 violence option even when order appears to collapse around them The authors also explore how for instance systems of organizing survive violent disruptions to the so called rhythms of everyday life and when they do how they are then repurposed by youth to help them survive violence Space and planning in secondary cities Lochner Marais, Verna Nel, 2019-09-01 Much of the urban research focuses on the large metropolitan areas in South Africa This book assesses spatial planning in the second tier cities of the country Secondary cities are vital as they perform essential regional and in some cases global economic roles and help to distribute the population of a country more evenly across its surface Apartheid planning left South African cities fragmented segregated and with low densities Post apartheid policies aim to reverse these realities by emphasising integration higher densities and upgrading Achieving these aims has been challenging and often the historical patterns continue The evidence shows that two opposing patterns prevail namely increased densities and continued urban sprawl This book presents ten case studies of spatial planning and spatial transformation in secondary cities of South Africa The book frames these case studies against complexity theory and suggests that the post apartheid response to apartheid planning represents a linear deviation from history.
