Cook, 2020-10-26 *Ancestors Kings and the Dao* outlines the evolution of musical performance in early China first within and then ultimately away from the socio religious context of ancestor worship Examining newly discovered bamboo texts from the Warring States period Constance A Cook compares the rhetoric of Western Zhou 1046 771 BCE and Spring and Autumn 770 481 BCE bronze inscriptions with later occurrences of similar terms in which ritual music began to be used as a form of self cultivation and education Cook's analysis links the creation of such classics as the Book of Odes with the ascendance of the individual practitioner further connecting the social actors in three types of ritual boys coming of age heirs promoted into ancestral government positions and the philosophical stages of transcendence experienced in self cultivation The focus of this study is on excavated texts it is the first to use both bronze and bamboo narratives to show the evolution of a single ritual practice By viewing the ancient inscribed materials and the transmitted classics from this new perspective Cook uncovers new linkages in terms of how the materials were shaped and reshaped over time and illuminates

the development of eulogy and song in changing ritual contexts

**Our Indigenous Ancestors** Carolyne R.

Larson, 2015-08-13 *Our Indigenous Ancestors* complicates the history of the erasure of native cultures and the perceived domination of white European heritage in Argentina through a study of anthropology museums in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Carolyne Larson demonstrates how scientists, collectors, the press, and the public engaged with Argentina's native American artifacts and remains and sometimes living peoples in the process of constructing an authentic national heritage. She explores the founding and functioning of three museums in Argentina as well as the origins and consolidation of Argentine archaeology and the professional lives of a handful of dynamic curators and archaeologists using these institutions and individuals as a window onto nation building, modernization, urban/rural tensions, and problems of race and ethnicity in turn-of-the-century Argentina. Museums and archaeology, she argues, allowed Argentine elites to build a modern national identity distinct from the country's indigenous past even as it rested on a celebrated, extinct version of that past. As Larson shows, contrary to widespread belief, elements of Argentina's native American past were reshaped and integrated into the construction of Argentine national identity as white and European at the turn of the century. *Our Indigenous Ancestors* provides a unique look at the folklore movement, nation building, science, institutional change, and the divide between elite scientific and popular culture in Argentina and the Americas at a time of rapid, sweeping changes in Latin American culture and society.

*The House of Our Ancestors* is a study of the Mountain Balinese or Bali Aga, an ethnic group with a distinct history and culture who are thought to be the indigenous people of Bali, Indonesia. In popular ideas of Balinese identity, the highland people feature as the conceptual counterpart to the royal houses established in the southern lowlands of the island. Hidden in shadow of this courtly culture, the world of the highland Balinese has been largely ignored, even though Bali counts among the most researched localities in the world. This book explores their social organization and status economy from the perspective of an innovative theory of precedence. Regional domains, villages, and origin houses among the Bali Aga are all conceived and ranked in reference to the basic ideas of a sacred origin in the past and of an order of precedence connecting the past with the present. The analysis of precedence ranking evident at all levels of Bali Aga social organization leads to the development of a new theory of status for Austronesian societies that departs radically from the notion of hierarchy as proposed by Louis Dumont in his classic study of the Indian caste system.
