Ways of Going Home Alejandro Zambra, 2013-01-08 The writer son of a quiet sympathizer with the Pinochet regime reflects on the progress of his novel in which an unnamed boy from a Chilean suburb witnesses an earthquake and meets an older girl who asks him to spy on her uncle Ways of Going Home Alejandro Zambra, 2024-08-06 Alejandro Zambra s Ways of Going Home begins with an earthquake seen through the eyes of an unnamed nine year old boy who lives in an undistinguished middleclass housing development in a suburb of Santiago Chile When the neighbors camp out overnight the protagonist gets his first glimpse of Claudia an older girl who asks him to spy on her uncle Ra l In the second section the protagonist is the writer of the story begun in the first section His father is a man of few words who claims to be apolitical but who quietly sympathized to what degree the author isn t sure with the Pinochet regime His reflections on the progress of the novel and on his own life which is strikingly similar to the life of his novel s protagonist expose the raw suture of fiction and reality Ways of Going Home switches between author and character past and present reflecting with melancholy and rage on the history of a nation and on a generation born too late the generation which as the author narrator puts it learned to read and write while their parents became accomplices or victims It is the most personal novel to date from Zambra the most important Chilean author since Roberto Bola o The Private Lives of Trees Alejandro Zambra, 2023-02-14 The second novel by the internationally celebrated writer Alejandro Zambra a short and strikingly original The New Yorker book about the stories we spin for ourselves and our loved ones now reissued by Penguin Veronica is late and Juli n is increasingly convinced she won t ever come home To pass the time he improvises a story about trees to coax his stepdaughter Daniela to sleep He has made a life as a literature professor developing a novel about a man tending to a bonsai tree on the weekends He is a narrator an architect a chronicler of other people's stories But as the night stretches on before him and the hours pass with no sign of Veronica Juli n finds himself caught up in the slipstream of the story of his life of their lives together What combination of desire and coincidence led them here to this very night What will the future and possibly motherless Daniela think of him and his stories Why tell stories at all The second novel by acclaimed Chilean writer Alejandro Zambra The Private Lives of Trees overflows with his signature wit and his gift for crafting short novels that manage to contain whole Not to Read Alejandro Zambra, 2018 Over the course of the chronicles and literary essays that make up this worlds volume Alejandro Zambra outlines his own particular theory of reading Whether it is in the course of a carefully considered commentary on a specific book or in the digressions born out of a piece on this or that author from Parra Levrero and Pavese to Mill n Ribeyro Tanizaki or Bola o Natalia Ginzburg and Puig the simple act of reading dominates these pages within which the author alternates between forceful and good humoured rants against clich's and impostures and intimist celebrations of true literary experiences.
