### ABOUT THE TITLE

*Waiting for the Barbarians* references the novel's townsfolk waiting for an impending attack from the barbarians rumored to be circling their gates. As they wait, panic spreads, bringing out the citizens' own barbarism as they descend into distrust and torture of outsiders, including nomads and fisherfolk. The title suggests that the townsfolk need not have waited for the barbarians. They were there all along.

## Literature of Colonialism

Although the town and empire in *Waiting for the Barbarians* are not named, it is clearly a novel dealing with the experience of the colonialism of Coetzee's home country under British rule. Nearly all the African continent was colonized, or dominated, by different European countries in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Novels depicting this experience include masterpieces such as *Heart of Darkness* (1899) by the Polish-British writer Joseph Conrad and *Things Fall Apart* (1958) by Nigerian writer Chinua Achebe.

Colonialism involves significant, permanent resettlement by the colonizing country in the colonized territory. Colonialism also involves the colonizer's direct economic, military, cultural, and political control of the colonized people. In the context of the novel, "the Empire" moved into the foreign land of the "barbarians" and simply took over. They resettled the indigenous people and created vast gated towns that excluded them.
