### **Chapter 1**

1. Describe the setting of the story.

The story is set in Maycomb, Alabama. It is a tired, country town. Grass grows on the sidewalks, porches come into bad shape in the rain. The time period of the story is not directly stated, but it is sometime soon after FDR's inaugural presidential address when he claimed that we, as a nation, have "nothing to fear but fear itself." This speech was in 1933.

Boo Radley is also known as Arthur Radley. He got in trouble with the law when he was young; he was hanging out with the wrong crowd, some of the Cunningham from Old Sarum. When he got in trouble, his father locked him in the house instead of sending him off to an industrial reform school with the other boys. He has become a recluse and he doesn't come out of the house. No one goes near the Radley house; it remained constantly shut up and they see little activity from the house, despite Maycomb's social culture.
