Texts in Multiple Versions Luigi Giuliani, Herman Brinkman, Geert Lernout, Marita Mathijsen, 2006 Texts in multiple versions constitute the core problem of textual scholarship For texts from antiquity and the medieval period the many versions may be the result of manuscript transmission requiring editors and readers to discriminate between levels of authority in variant readings produced along the chain of copying For texts of all periods and particularly for more modern authors there may also be multiple authorial versions These are of particular importance for genetic criticism as they offer a window on the author's thinking through the developing work The different contexts in which multiple versions may occur different languages different genres different cultures ranging in this collection from ancient Greek texts to novels by Cervantes and Aub dramatic texts from Portugal and Germany poetry from The Netherlands and Lithuania scientific texts from the 19th century provide further layers of complexity The histories of countries are reflected in the histories of editing In Europe this can be seen particularly in the great period of nation building of the 19th century Essays in this volume survey editorial activity in The Netherlands Belgium and Germany in the nineteenth century concluding that nation building and scholarly editing are twinned As a nation searches for its own identity textual scholarship is pressed into service to find and edit the texts on which to establish that identity The two strands of this volume multiple versions of texts editions and national histories testify to the centrality of textual editing to many fields of research There is material here for literary scholars historians and for readers interested in texts from Ancient Greece to modernist classics Willem, Van den vos Reynaerde (Fragment), 2017

The Medieval Opus: Imitation, Rewriting and Transmission in the French Tradition, 1996 The Medieval Opus is a broad but detailed study of the art of imitation as rewriting that was practiced in medieval French texts and in texts in other languages influenced by French models It contains the proceedings of a symposium on this topic The volume will be of interest to scholars and students of medieval French as well as other medieval literatures influenced by French models The range of texts is broad from epic to romance and from lyric to late medieval lyric narrative genres The authors teach in a number of countries in Europe and North America and they represent a variety of approaches ages and critical perspectives on medieval rewriting Two major concepts inform the papers the bridge work and the specimen text The bridge work Tony Hunt's term refers here to two works that have identifiable links to others and that by those links reveals something of the art of writing for both works Specimen texts are works representative of the art of imitation illustrated by the bridge works The proceedings move beyond the analysis of a general art of composition to investigate original rewriting in specific works that serve as specimen texts The goal of the proceedings has been to appreciate originality within the framework of the medieval art of literary writing **Willem Usselinx** John Franklin Jameson, 1891 Literature without Frontiers Cornelis van der Haven, Youri Desplenter, J.A. Reynard the Fox Kenneth Varty, 2003-12-01 There are many stories featuring the villainous hero Reynard the Fox in many languages told over many centuries going back as far as the early 12th century All these stories are comic and much of the humour depends on parody and satire resulting in mockery sometimes the subversion of certain kinds of serious literature of political and religious institutions and practices of scholarly argument and moralizing and of popular beliefs and customs The contributors to this volume all of them experts in one or more of the Reynard stories and their backgrounds focus on the transformation of these tales through various media and to what extent they reflect differences in the cultural class and generational background of their tellers

Top Ten Fictional Narratives in Early Modern Europe Rita Schlusemann, Helwi Blom, Anna Katharina Richter, Krystyna Wierzbicka-Trwoga, 2023-10-24 This volume examines the ten most popular fictional narratives in early modern Europe between 1470 and 1800 Each of these narratives was marketed in numerous European languages and circulated throughout several centuries Combining literary studies and book history this work offers for the first time a transnational perspective on a selected text corpus of this genre It explores the spatio-temporal transmission of the texts in different languages and the materiality of the editions the narratives were bought sold read translated and adapted across European borders from the south of Spain to Iceland and from Great Britain to Poland Thus the study analyses the multifaceted processes of cultural circulation translation and adaptation of the texts In their diverse forms of mediality such as romance drama ballad and penny prints they also make a significant contribution to a European identity in the early modern period The narrative texts examined here include Apollonius Septem sapientum Amadis de Gaula Fortunatus Pierre de

Reynard the Fox Thomas W. Best, 1983 Reynard the Fox is a literary cycle of medieval allegorical Dutch English French and German fables The first extant versions of the cycle date from the second half of the 12th century The genre was popular throughout the Late Middle Ages as well as in chapbook form throughout the Early Modern period The stories are largely concerned with the main character Reynard an anthropomorphic red fox trickster figure His adventures usually involve his deceiving other anthropomorphic animals for his own advantage or trying to avoid their retaliatory efforts His main enemy and victim across the cycle is his uncle the wolf Isengrim or Ysengrim

Reynard the Fox Elaine C. Block, 2000 edited by Kenneth Varty Reynard the Fox and his confrontations with other named animals were a common feature of Latin and vernacular Beast Epics throughout the medieval period
