Unlike the ancient one, modern man is developing much faster, and this year, from the point of view of evolution, is equal to the previous century. The population of the Earth today is much more diverse than before. People differ by race and nationality and by physical and intellectual level, preferences, tastes, habits, and type of social organization. Man is a sociobiological being who has two components – biological and social. All these significant changes in the development of humanity and its formation became possible due to anthroposociogenesis. It is anthroposociogenesis that explains the dichotomy between biology and culture and the connection with human evolution.

Anthroposociogenesis is a historically long process of human development from a biological being into a social and cultural one. It represents the unity of two parallel processes: anthropogenesis, the formation of man, and sociogenesis, the development of society (Larsen 90). In other words, it is a transition from a biological form of matter movement to a socially organized one. The content of anthroposociogenesis is the emergence and formation of social patterns, the restructuring, and the change of the driving forces of development that determine the direction of evolution. The central issue of anthroposociogenesis is the problem of driving forces and patterns (Larsen 96). Since the driving forces of evolution are not fixed, they can only be studied in action, that is, at the moment, based on extrapolation. The general picture of anthropogenesis is reconstructed based on geographically and chronologically incomplete data, and the
