It is this reticence that the monograph sees as the main problem of Didion's fiction and presents it as the silent center of gravity in Didion's oeuvre. The monograph proposes to see the melancholy expressed by Didion's fiction organized into four losses: of Nature, History, Ethics and Language, around which the main analytical chapters are constructed. What remains unrepresented and silenced comes back to haunt Didion's fiction and it results in a melancholic portrayal of California and its identity, which is the central theme this monograph addresses.
