Welsh writer Arthur Machen (1863-1947) is one of the towering figures in the Golden Age of weird fiction and his novels and tales have influenced generations of weird writers and remain immensely popular among readers. But much of his work has been difficult to obtain, remaining buried in obscure magazines and newspapers of a century ago or published in expensive limited editions. This is the first edition of Machen's fiction to be based on a thorough examination of his manuscripts and early publications. It is also the first edition to arrange Machen's fiction chronologically by date of writing. The edition has been prepared by S. T. Joshi, a leading authority on weird fiction and the author of *The Weird Tale* (1990) and *Unutterable Horror: A History of Supernatural Fiction* (2012). Joshi has prepared textually corrected editions of the work of H. P. Lovecraft, Ambrose Bierce and many other weird writers.
