Allegory, Space and the Material World in the Writings of Edmund Spenser Christopher Burlinson, 2006 An examination of the way in which the material world is depicted in *The Faerie Queene* This book provides a radical reassessment of Spenserian allegory in particular of *The Faerie Queene* in the light of contemporary historical and theoretical interests in space and material culture It explores the ambiguous and fluctuating attention to materiality objects and substance in the poetics of *The Faerie Queene* and discusses the way that Spenser's creation of allegorical meaning makes use of this materiality and transforms it It suggests further that a critical engagement with materiality which has been so important to the recent study of early modern drama must come in the case of allegorical narrative through a study of narrative and physical space and in this context it goes on to provide a reading of the spatial dimensions of the poem quests and battles forests castles and hovels and the spatial characteristics of Spenser's other writings The book reaffirms the need to place Spenser in his historical contexts philosophical and scientific military and architectural in early modern England Ireland and Europe but also provides a critical reassessment of this literary historicism Dr CHRISTOPHER BURLINSON is a Research Fellow in English at Emmanuel College Cambridge

Encountering Religion Tyler Roberts, 2013-09-17 Tyler Roberts encourages scholars to abandon rigid conceptual oppositions between secular and religious to better understand how human beings actively and thoughtfully engage with their worlds and make meaning The artificial distinction between a self-conscious and critical academic study of religion and an ideological and authoritarian religion he argues only obscures the phenomenon Instead Roberts calls on intellectuals to approach the field as a site of encounter and response illuminating the agency creativity and critical awareness of religious actors To respond to religion is to ask what religious behaviors and representations mean to us in our individual worlds and scholars must confront questions of possibility and becoming that arise from testing their beliefs imperatives and practices Roberts refers to the work of Hent de Vries Eric Santner and Stanley Cavell each of whom exemplifies encounter and response in their writings as they traverse philosophy and religion to expose secular thinking to religious thought and practice This approach highlights the resources religious discourse can offer to a fundamental reorientation of critical thought In humanistic criticism after secularism the lines separating the creative the pious and the critical themselves become the subject of question and experimentation

Nyman,2022-02-28 This study examines masculinity and individualism in four American novels of the 1920s and 1930s usually regarded as belonging to the genre of hard boiled fiction The novels under study are Red Harvest by Dashiell Hammett The Postman Always Rings Twice by James M Cain They Shoot Horses Don t They by Horace McCoy and To Have and Have Not by Ernest Hemingway In this first full length study of gender in hard boiled fiction the genre is discussed as a representation of the ideologies of masculinity and individualism Hard boiled fiction is located in its historical and cultural

context and it is argued that the genre with its explicit emphasis on masculinity and masculine virtues attempts to reaffirm a masculine order. The study argues that this emphasis is a counter reaction to more general changes in the gender relations of the period. Indeed, hard-boiled fiction is argued to be an attempt to reconstruct a masculine identity based on anti-modern values generally accepted in the cultural context of the genre.

The Practice of Theory Keith Moxey, 2018-07-05. Many art historians regard poststructuralist theory with suspicion; some even see its focus on the political dimension of language as hostile to an authentic study of the past. Keith Moxey bridges the gap between historical and theoretical approaches with the provocative argument that we cannot have one without the other. With his compelling analysis of the politics of interpretation, Moxey draws attention to a vital aspect of the cultural importance of history.

A Marxist Critique of Latin American Colonial Studies Malcolm K. Read, 2019-01-21. During the mid-1980s, Latin American colonial studies came to be dominated by the various post-movements: post-structuralism, post-modernism, post-Marxism, characterized by their promotion of discursivity as the ultimate horizon of sociality.
