Carrington, 2017-06-30 This bookexamines liberty s Constitutional meaning through the jurisprudence of Justice Stephen Field one of the late Nineteenth Century's most influential Supreme Court Justices A Lincoln appointee who served on the Court from 1863 1897 Field articulated a view of Constitutional liberty that speaks to contemporary disputes Today some see liberty as protection through government regulation against private oppression Others see liberty as protection from government through limits on governmental power Justice Field is often viewed as siding against government power to regulate acting as a pre cursor to the infamous Lochner Era of the Court This work explains how Field instead saw both these competing conceptions of liberty as legitimate In fact the two cooperated toward a common end In his opinions Field argued that protections through and from government worked in tandem to guard fundamental individual rights In describing this view of liberty Field addressed key Constitutional provisions that remain a source of debate including some of the earliest interpretations of the Due Process Clause its relationship to state police power and civil rights and some of the earliest assertions of a national police power through the Commerce Clause This work

furthermore addresses the underpinnings of Field's views namely that he grounded his reading of the Constitution in the context of the common law and the Declaration of Independence In his principles as well as his approach this book argues Justice Field presents a helpful discussant in ongoing debates regarding the meaning of liberty and of the Constitution Order of the President Phillip J. Cooper, 2014-12-05 Scholars and citizens alike have endlessly debated the proper limits of presidential action within our democracy In this revised and expanded edition noted scholar Phillip Cooper offers a cogent guide to these powers and shows how presidents from George Washington to Barack Obama have used and abused them in trying to realize their visions for the nation As Cooper reveals there has been virtually no significant policy area or level of government left untouched by the application of these presidential power tools Whether seeking to regulate the economy committing troops to battle without a congressional declaration of war or blocking commercial access to federal lands presidents have wielded these powers to achieve their goals often in ways that seem to fly in the face of true representative government Cooper defines the different forms these powers take executive orders presidential memoranda proclamations national security directives and signing statements demonstrates their uses critiques their strengths and dangers and shows how they have changed over time Cooper calls on events in American history with which we are all familiar but whose implications may have escaped us Examples of executive action include Washington's Neutrality Proclamation Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation the more than 1 700 executive orders issued by Woodrow Wilson in World War I FDR also issued the order to incarcerate Japanese Americans during World War II Truman's orders to desegregate the military Eisenhower's numerous national security directives JFK s order to control racial violence in Alabama As Cooper demonstrates in his balanced treatment of these and subsequent presidencies each successive administration finds new ways of using these tools to achieve policy goals especially those goals they know they are unlikely to accomplish with the help of Congress A key feature of the second edition are case studies on the post 9 11 evolution of presidential direct action in ways that have drawn little public attention It clarifies the factors that make these policy tools so attractive to presidents and the consequences that can flow from their use and abuse in a post 9 11 environment There is an important new chapter on executive agreements which though they are not treaties within the meaning of the U S Constitution and not subject to Senate ratification appear in many respects to be rapidly replacing treaties as instruments of foreign policy Focus On: 100 Most Popular 20Th-century Edward Terry Sanford Stephanie L. Smith, 2024-11-25 The 25 Day Vice President Alabama's William Rufus de Vane King documents the life and times of an often overlooked 19th Century statesman Born to wealth and privilege in North Carolina King grew up to become an attorney and was elected by Tarheel voters to serve in the State Legislator and U S Congress In 1819 after serving in Europe as Legation Secretary for the American Foreign Minister to the Two Sicilies and Russia King migrated to the Alabama Territory He guickly became a prominent member of the territory s rapidly growing slaveholding planter class aristocracy As an established community leader King helped construct a new city near his plantation home Furthermore he was credited with naming the community Selmz in honor of a favorite Ossian poem After Alabama was admitted to the Union King was elected as one of the 22nd state s first U S Senators For nearly three decades he served in the Senate representing his adopted home state As a slaveholder King believed perpetuation of the barbaric institution was a Constitutional right Nonetheless he never joined forces with the so called fire eaters rabid secessionists who advocated disunion if the federal government threatened to abolish slavery As a Moderate Democrat King was a political conciliator rather than agitator While serving in the U S Senate he facilitated compromises between pro and anti slavery forces temporarily forestalling inevitable secession and the bloody American Civil War As a conciliator and compromiser King was a political anomaly in the Deep South King died in March 1853 just 25 days after he was sworn into office as the 13th Vice President of the United States and eight years before the onset of the Civil War Inaugurated while he was seeking treatment for terminal tuberculosis in the island nation of Cuba King remains the first and only American President or Vice President to take the oath of office on foreign soil King was no doubt an enigmatic figure He was a respected statesman who vainly sought to save America from disunion In his later years he resigned from Congress to serve as Foreign Minister to France where he convinced the European power to refrain from interfering with America s Manifest Destiny expansionist agenda While mild mannered and chivalrous King was never a shrinking violet On at least three separate occasions he accepted challenges to participate in potentially deadly duels when his honor was called into question As a lifelong bachelor King was the target of unsubstantiated rumors and innuendo concerning his sexual orientation Political enemies repeatedly proclaimed King was gay derisively nicknaming him Miss Fancy The 25 Day Vice President is a compelling narrative Much of William R King s life journey unfolded during America s tumultuous Antebellum era when the nation was not yet a century old While slavery proved to be the most divisive issue other controversies led to bitter disagreements and the formation of rival political parties Given the taboo nature of same sex relationships in the 19th Century King's private life is explored under a detailed and objective light Readers will be challenged to judge whether individuals personal and private choices detract from their accomplishments or meaningfully alter the historical record Undoubtedly King is one of many lesser known public figures who helped weave America's complex political and social fabric **Doing Oral History** Donald A.
