Instead, by focusing primarily on Tercera residencia 1935-1945, Greg Dawes argues for an uneven yet steady evolution and continuity in Neruda's work, politics, and morality. Dawes relies on historical accounts, biographies, literary history, and criticism, and on Neruda's political and aesthetic theory to prove that his poetry became contrary to received critical opinion, more sophisticated literarily and politically as he became more radicalized during the Spanish Civil War and World War II, and as he developed his dialectical realism or guided spontaneity.
